The 4 Seasons of Reconciliation is a 3-hour online educational learning resource which promotes a renewed relationship between Indigenous Peoples and Canadians, through transformative and engaging learning towards anti-racism education. The goal of this resource is to support faculty and staff at our university to provide diversity and inclusion awareness through a 3-hour asynchronous online courses. It features award-winning films, slideshows, videos, quizzes and a completion certificate offered by the University Library.
